About US!

Let's see. Last time we left off in 1916. Lots happened - and very quickly - after that.

George F. Hixson, of Rochester, NY, was elected the first International President. You will recognize that name, I'm sure. One of the major awards from Kiwanis International Foundation bears the name "George F. Hixson Fellowship." Now you know the significance of the name!

1917 now. The 2nd annual convention, in Detroit, came complete with controversy. One group favored Alan Browne and his idea of the organization's purpose to offer mutual business benefits for members. The other group contended that long-term success of the organization depended upon a more lofty ideal: community service. Nothing was settled.

Next year, 1918, membership soared to 10,000, and a two-room headquarters office was opened in Chicago. The annual convention was held in Providence, RI.

At the 1919 convention, in Birmingham, AL, controversy continued over the purpose of the organization, and also arose over Alan Browne himself, who had not exactly endeared himself to a large block of members. The net result was the offer from Alan Browne to sell all rights to the organization for \$17,500. That sum was quickly raised right on the convention floor - - and Alan Browner was gone!

1920 is next. A spurt of growth - membership soars to 28,500 in 265 Clubs. International Convention, in Portland, OR adopts first motto: "We Build."

1921 was the year that the State of Michigan issued the charter to Kiwanis, and January 21 is ever after celebrated as our "birthday," though, as you see above, a LOT when on before that time.
